Taiwan Studies the Efficacy of Therapeutic Riding on Children with Autism Spectrum Disorder

I was invited to Taiwan to speak about how therapeutic riding helps children with Autism. Like so many other countries, there has been a marked increase in the number of children diagnosed with Autism or some disability within the Autism Disorder spectrum.

Upon arrival I was met by Uta, the senior instructor of the Therapeutic Riding Centre Taiwan. Uta is a most generous and kind hostess who immediately put me at ease, making me feel at home. The Therapeutic Riding Centre Taiwan is a unique center situated on the grounds of an institution or "home" for the mentally challenged. The home belongs to a wonderful, caring Taiwanese family who has devoted their life to helping others less fortunate than themselves.

The home is self supporting, in that its members, the mentally challenged students, contribute to their living costs by working in a bakery and coffee shop on the premises founded by the owners. All house members learn to bake, take care of the facilities, or work in the coffee shop serving customers who enjoy the pleasant atmosphere and homemade food. In addition, those who are able are expected to assist in the therapeutic riding center, by either walking alongside a horse during a lesson, or assisting with stable duties.

At the Therapeutic Riding Centre Taiwan is a strong sense of purpose, a soul, and enthusiasm that few centers could match. The Center is very active, providing therapeutic riding sessions to about 90 riders per week. The horses there are reliable and kind. They have good rhythmic movements that make them suitable for the many different kinds of treatments that are provided by both instructors and physiotherapists.

Amongst the riders at the center are several children with Autism Spectrum Disorders. The goal of instructors and therapists is to apply techniques that persuade non-speaking children to speak, and combat lack of relatedness, sensory motor problems and communication skills by lowering the problems of interference with input information, processing and response. Ultimately, they seek to help these children find a way to relate to their world via the horse. During my time there I was able to demonstrate some of the techniques that I have found in my experience to be very successful.

It is a fact that when autistic children are able to develop a normal, warm and trusting relationship with a horse, they then have the potential to develop such relationships with others who enter into their life. I was able to show how an autistic child can be helped to relax through the horse's rhythmic movement, allowing time for both verbal and non-verbal interaction that both arouses and releases imagination. During the second day of the clinic attended by physiotherapists, we had the opportunity to discuss the importance of sensory integration, input and processing from the horse to the rider. This important issue is often the key to achieving successful rhythmic connection with the horses movement, rehabilitation and remedial training for riders who are physically challenged. While at the center we spent time analyzing the horses' rhythmic movement.

Many countries will be seeking out horses for use in the upcoming months before the WEG begins in September. They will be looking for horses for riders in all five of the Para-Equestrian grades. Anyone who has a horse available and is interested in participating in the WEG movement is encouraged to visit:

where available horses will be listed. All arrangements will be made between the horse owner and the rider; this is a great opportunity to make horses available to potential international riders.



Therapeutic Riding Research Opportunity

Therapeutic horseback riding is used as a means of physical and psychological therapy for individuals with a very wide spread of developmental, neurological and behavioural disorders. While great strides have been made over the past 15 years, there is little evidence-based research in the field that supports therapeutic riding as a viable alternative therapy.

Are you an RDA parent or do you know one?

Samantha is asking for RDA parents input for her current research project to 'help determine whether or not equine-assisted activities have any links with aggression and social competence in

children with special needs'.

Many NARHA Accredited Centres (USA) and RDA UK Centres have already agreed to participate. Samantha would like to include RDA Centres in Australia. She has already carried out a pilot survey

with parents of participants of a therapeutic riding center in the United States in an attempt to determine whether or not equine-assisted

activities had any links with aggression and social competence in children with special needs. Her results, despite the small response, were phenomenal and have prompted her to continue this line of research. Samantha is now distributing a survey for parents of children & adolescents 17 years of age and younger to complete. This survey will be accessible as an online form and she will be asking parents

worldwide to complete it. The survey will only take about 15 minutes to complete and no personally identifying information will asked so that confidentiality is maintained.

Samantha's would like to receive 1,000+ responses from participating countries (i.e. Australia, UK and USA) and hopes that this study will produce evidence-based research to support passionate parents & professionals claims that equine assisted activity can assist children with special needs. The more parents who participate in this
